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A Word from the Pastor

Holy Week

²Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God. ³For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest ye be wearied and faint in your minds. (Hebrews 12:2-3, KJV)

It is always the proper starting point for us: Consider Jesus who "endured such contradiction of sinners against himself." He endured that contradiction and hostility, yet continued steadfast in his love and his work to save such a contrary world.

In this year's Midweek Lent Series, we are exploring Saint Paul's conviction that the Holy Spirit produces fruit in us (Galatians 5:22-25). The first fruit of the Spirit is love. Most recently we are looking at the fourth fruit: patience. If you have ever wanted to see patience at work in this world, consider Matthew 26. Let me lift up two passages from that chapter. The first speaks of the power that Jesus *could* exercise if he chose to:

⁵¹And, behold, one of them which were with Jesus stretched out his hand, and drew his sword, and struck a servant of the high priest's, and smote off his ear. ⁵²Then said Jesus unto him, Put up again thy sword into his place: for all they that take the sword shall perish with the sword. ⁵³Thinkest thou that I cannot now pray to my Father, and he shall presently give me more than twelve legions of angels? (Matthew 26:51-53, KJV)

Be appalled, world, at that prospect! If Jesus had unleashed one angel against our world, that would have been enough to ruin us, to say nothing of twelve legions of them.

Now skip ahead a few verses to this scene of interrogation. It starts off with the high priest asking the elders and council a question:

⁶⁶What think ye? They answered and said, He is guilty of death. ⁶⁷Then did they spit in his face, and buffeted him; and others smote him with the palms of their hands, ⁶⁸Saying, Prophesy unto us, thou Christ, Who is he that smote thee? (Matthew 26:66-68, KJV)

Here we see divine patience at high pitch. The angels surely flinched at such a sight, to see their Lord spat upon and buffeted. Yet Jesus bore it patiently. Your eternal welfare was at stake. So he bore with the abuse patiently.

During Holy Week we meditate on these things, giving ourselves over to the story of our Lord's betrayal, abandonment, crucifixion, death, and then resurrection! Holy Week is soon here. It will be very good to be with you as often as you can here at Immanuel.

An Update on our Roof, Masonry, and Steeple Project Some notes from Pastor Fryer

On Tuesday evening April 1, we signed the contract with Baschnagel Bros. Inc for the new slate roof for our church, new tin-coated stainless steel roof for our steeple, and needed masonry repairs. A dear member of our congregation, who knew that we were scheduled to sign the contract that evening, stopped by the church and left a bottle of champagne for us. And so it was that even shy, plain Lutherans lifted a glass and saluted a job well done.

Permits are being sought now, materials are being ordered, and work schedules are being refined. If all goes well, construction will begin the day after Easter Sunday and will finish the end of the year.

I have probably mentioned this before, but let me say it again: Watching the work of our Roof Committee, along with John G. Waite Architects, has been like watching a fine chamber music group at work. Each person brought devotion to the work and distinct skills, and it all worked together harmoniously. Evelyn Junge was our superb conductor. Our church owes a lot to her, in my opinion, along with all the members of the Roof Committee. Here they are:

"Second Sunday" Evening Worship

Palm Sunday, April 13, *Lectio Divina*, 4 p.m., Vespers, 5 p.m. Easter Sunday, April 20, Vespers, 1 p.m. in the Martin Luther Room Led by Rev. Kelly-Ray Meritt

Lectio Divina this month falls on the Sunday of the Passion (Palm Sunday). Since this is only a few days before our liturgical observance of Jesus' death on Good Friday, we will shift our format to consider a few of the many ways Christians have meditated on Christ's suffering. This will be more didactic than usual, with a view towards enriching your individual meditation throughout Holy Week. Join us at 4:00 pm on Sunday, April 13.

Evening Prayer on Sunday of Holy Week is an unusually solemn service with a long and rich tradition. The *Lucernarium* (or Service of Light, with its hymn "Joyous Light") and the doxologies after each psalm and canticle are omitted, not to limit festivity but because the form of this service returns to the earliest practice of the Church, before the christological controversies of the Nicene era. Nonetheless two hymn meditations on Christ's Passion of later composition will be sung: Fortunatus' "The royal banners," describing Jesus' reign from the Cross as from a throne, and Isaac

Watts' "Nature with open volume," considering the limits of human comprehension before the mystery of our salvation. Sunday, April 13, at 5:00 pm, following *Lectio Divina*.

Easter Vespers has been much neglected in modern times, especially as more congregations have become familiar with the Great Vigil of Easter. Occurring right after the complex and moving services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, the Vigil on Holy Saturday, and Easter morning, Easter Vespers has always been a bit abbreviated. Yet it contains a liturgical gem: reading the account of the Risen Lord meeting some disciples on the way to Emmaus at the very time it occurred. (See Luke 24.) To facilitate your participation, we will celebrate Easter Vespers at 1:00 pm in the conference room, shortly after the festive Easter morning Liturgy. Have a coffee, then join us to conclude the Triduum in joyful prayer.

Immanuel Artists in Residence Show

Please note change of date: Now being held on Saturday, May 17^{th} 7-9 p.m.

Last March, our own John Wilson prepared a showing of the art he has been inspired to create, partially as a result of his in-depth analysis of the Book of Job. Using wood, barbed wire, clothing hangers and other found objects, John has sculpted crucifixions, angels, and other figures both sacred and secular.

Now, on the night of Saturday, May 17, 2014, John will once more display over a dozen of his works in the undercroft of Immanuel Lutheran Church. This year, John is joined by Immanuel member Clifford Rose, the creator of our John the Baptist banner. Clifford will display some of his paintings, and Roberta Albrecht, a former member who currently lives in Wisconsin, has contributed some of her drawings and greeting cards.

Beginning at 7:00 p.m., there will be a wine and cheese reception, and all works will be for sale with a portion of the proceeds of the sale to be donated to the church. Music will be provided by the well-known Jazz Pianist, Marjorie Eliot, joined by Nick Mauro on Trumpet, and Gaku Takanashi on Bass.

For those unable to attend Saturday night, John has agreed to leave his work on display on Sunday, May 18th, through the end of Coffee Hour.
