A Word from the Pastor

Advent/Christmas

Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God.

(Isaiah 40:1, KJV)

Now let me say again, if you've found yourself the miserable one, stained and sullied by your sin, wondering if there can be any meaning come out of this thing any more at all, then take heart, my friend, for the God who comes to us in Christ comes to speak <u>comfort</u>, to give you courage, and to enable you to stand strongly and firmly.

There was an old man who was ending his preaching ministry. Somebody said to him, "Tell us, if you had to begin your ministry all over again, what notes would you strike that heretofore you have not struck? or with what accent would you preach the Gospel in a way that might be different than what you've already done?" And the man who had lived the years fully and well simply replied: "If I had my years to live over again, I would strike the note of comfort in a way that I've never struck it before. For if the years have taught me anything, the years have taught me that men need to be empowered by God, they need to be put on their feet, they need to be given courage to persevere."

Rev. Raymond Shaheen "Four Words of Advent: Comfort" Sermon for the Third Sunday of Advent St. Luke Lutheran Church, Silver Spring, Maryland December 17, 1967 My dear old pastor, Rev. Raymond Shaheen, used to preach sermon series. Each summer he would retreat to his country cottage and plan his sermons for the coming year. He planned them, not according to the lectionary, but according to themes he wanted to develop. It is an old-fashioned way of preaching. In his case, it was a wonderful way of preaching.

The above excerpt comes from his Advent series of sermons called "Four Words of Advent." The other three words were "Forgiveness," "Fear," and "Behold."

In this particular sermon, Pastor Shaheen made the point that as the Bible reckons things, "comfort" is not a sweet, subjective emotion, but rather the sharing of strength with someone. It is the way of us humans that from time to time we find ourselves in such straits that if someone does not help us along, we might not make it. We stand in need of comfort.

The old preacher was right: One of the great privileges of the ordained ministry is the chance to try to make people stronger — not so much with earthly nourishment but with the food of heaven, with the Gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Pastor Shaheen sought to do that throughout his long ministry. I am trying too. Every pastor tries.

Let us each one come to church this Advent, this Christmas, and all the year long with our hearts open for the comfort and strength of God's Word.

Some notes from Pastor Fryer


The nave lights in the next page's picture are whimsical, but temporary. In our vast space, they look like moons and planets and heavenly orbs. The photo shows the fresh linen white of our walls, with contrasting pure white trim, light blue arch above our Transfiguration painting, and gold ornamental features.

Many thanks are due to Sexton Chris Schulze and his crew for their work in our church nave. Chris arranged for a floor company to refinish our floors. Chris and his crew repaired and refinished our pews. And a light designer has been crafting Gothic-style pendant lights to be suspended over our pews as they were in olden days. We have cleaned our beautiful rear altar and we are working on improving

the lighting on our Transfiguration painting. Chris and his workers also have been working in the balcony. They removed the worn-out green carpet in the aisles and sanded and painted the wood to provide a harder sound surface for our organ and choir. Also, they have painted the emblems above the

doors throughout the nave
— emblems that I had not
even noticed before
because they were painted
over with white paint.

Our new Gothic-style pendants should be in place for the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 21. Our church looks beautiful! Come and see!
