March 2015 A Word from the Pastor

Lent

Consider him who endured such hostility against himself from sinners, so that you may not grow weary or lose heart. (Hebrews 12:3, NRSV)

In 1519, Martin Luther wrote a devotional treatise called *A Meditation on Christ's Passion*. He wrote it in the midst of other heavy work, including an exposition of the Lord's Prayer, a commentary on Galatians, and preparing for an important debate with his Catholic opponent John Eck. Why did he take time to work on this meditation on our Lord's Passion? Because people needed it. Their hearts cried out for it.

In the introduction to Luther's popular treatise, the American translator notes this:

The quick and widespread acceptance of this tract attests to the inner needs of the common people. Writings such as this, with their pastoral emphasis, attracted even more readers than those concerned with protest. ...his contact with the people in the parish forced him to take note of the areas in which the search for peace and salvation was most desperate. (LW 42:5)

Luther offers three main ideas when thinking about the cross and passion of Jesus:

(1) We are involved in our Lord's crucifixion. More than a century before Johann Heermann wrote Ah, Holy Jesus, with its moving line, "Who was the guilty? Who brought this upon thee? Alas, my treason, Jesus, hath undone thee," Luther urged a similar conviction upon his people:

It must be an inexpressible and unbearable earnestness that forces such a great and infinite person to suffer and die to appease it... Therefore, when you see the nails piercing Christ's hands, you can be certain that it is your work. When you behold his crown of thorns, you may rest assured that these are your evil thoughts, etc.

(2) Lest we despair when pondering the true measure of our sins — a measure so earnest that it cost the life of Jesus — Luther looks ahead to Easter and the revelation of God's love for us:

...you must no longer contemplate the suffering of Christ (for this has already done its work and terrified you), but pass beyond that and see his friendly heart and how this heart beats with such love for you that it impels him to bear with pain your conscience and your sin... We know God aright when we grasp him not in his might or wisdom (for then he proves terrifying), but in his kindness and love.

(3) Finally, Luther urges us to take the pattern of Christ's passion as our own:

After your heart has thus become firm in Christ, and love, not fear of pain, has made you a foe of sin, then Christ's passion must from that day on become a pattern for your entire life... If hatred, envy, and vindictiveness beset you, recall that Christ, who indeed had more reason to avenge himself, interceded with tears and cries for you and for all his enemies...

Jesus is the center of our Gospel. Our sorrow for sin, our pattern of daily life, and our hope in God's love all rest in him. May God grant us a good and holy Lent pondering his passion.

The "Seven Last Words" are often the text for Good Friday. Here in our town, I have preached three times over the years at nearby St. Ignatius during their three-hour Good Friday service.

This Lent we are hearing sermons by Lutheran theologian Gilbert Meilaender on the Seven Last Words. He has written two sermons for each word, so that is fourteen sermons altogether. If we double-up on Holy Wednesday, we can do seven sermons this year. That would leave another seven for next year. They are worth it!

Rev. Dr. Gilbert Meilaender is longtime professor of Christian Ethics at Valparaiso University. He has preached here at Immanuel, back in 1995. Here is the schedule for this year's sermons:
