

A Word from Pastor Gregory Paul Fryer

Genesis



ear Members and Friends of Immanuel Lutheran Church, In our church library in the Martin Luther Room, so far we have sixty-one volumes of *Luther's Works*. This is but the English-language portion of the larger German standard edition — the *Weimar edition of Martin Luther's Works*. Luther was a prolific scholar.

At first glance, you would think that Luther's beginning writings were on *Genesis*. After all, the first eight volumes of his many works are on that book. But the truth is that Luther's lectures on *Genesis* were the brilliant work of his old age. He spent his final years lecturing on the first book of the Bible. In his opening words to his students, Luther agrees with the stance of the Jewish rabbis that no one under thirty should be permitted to read or to expound for others the first chapter of Genesis.

It was not a deliberate policy on my part, but looking back I would say that for most of my ministry, I was moved by the instinct that I was not yet ready to lead a discussion of *Genesis*... that teaching that book required a kind of wisdom and learning that I did not yet have. Well, I still do not have that wisdom and learning. But it has dawned on me recently that if I am going to teach *Genesis*, I had better start now while there is still some time left.

Genesis is about us! It is about us humans before we became fragmented into races and clans. Its stories are old — older than the Church, older than Israel. They are old stories of creation, of divine blessing ruined by temptation, of having to earn our living by the sweat of our brow, of murder — even murder by one brother of another. And it is the story of the beginning ages of faith — the faith of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph. The rest of the Bible hardly makes sense unless we know the stories of Genesis.

So, I mean to devote our Thursday Evening Bible Study to *Genesis*. If you have taken Bible classes with me over the years, you know that I am not a great teacher. Pastor Lara is much better than I am. What I basically do is read the text aloud, comment on it as I go along, and invite the thoughts of anyone else in the class. The one virtue I hope I have is that I love the Bible. I love to try to enter into the world of the Bible and to see the dealings of our Maker and us human beings.

We meet in the Martin Luther Room and via Zoom. The class starts at 6:30 p.m. and goes for only forty-five minutes. Then we head off in our various directions for supper. Here is the Zoom information:

I love the energy on Sundays at Immanuel. I love hearing the organ and the cantors. I love the full liturgy and the longer sermon. I love the bustle and the conversations at coffee hour. But there is something different about our Wednesday evening spoken service. It is quieter, humbler. I find I can spend more time in prayer. It is easier for me to concentrate on worship. And I enjoy the fact that people sometimes wander in off the street simply because they saw our front doors opened welcomingly. I often get to meet new people this way and talk with them and pray with them in a way that cannot happen so easily on a Sunday, when so much is going on.

It would be wonderful to share a time of midweek worship with you. We are preaching our way through the Gospel of Matthew, which is a very different sort of preaching than the kind that is guided by the lectionary.

Pastor Greg does most of the preaching, and he takes each passage and unpacks its meaning and application to our lives in a straightforward way that reminds me of the Church Fathers or the old Puritan divines. Wednesday is a fine opportunity to connect with the Lord in the middle of a busy week and simply step back and rejoice with one another in His love and peace. I would be delighted to see you there.
