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# The Easter Vigil

7 p.m. Holy Saturday, March 30, 2024

arm welcome, everyone, to Immanuel Lutheran Church.
The Easter Vigil is the most important liturgy of the church year. In a magnificent way the Church expresses liturgically the meaning of her Lord's Pasch, his Passover. Our Lord's passage from death to life is the fulfillment of Israel's passage from bondage to freedom. The Vigil is also the celebration of our own passage through the waters of Holy Baptism. Finally, the Eucharist is a testimony to the coming greater celebration of life at the Messianic Banquet before the throne of God.

The Vigil liturgy consists of four parts: The Service of Light, The Service of Readings, the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, and the First Eucharist of the Resurrection:

## The Service of Light

At the start of the liturgy, we gather around the front steps of the church, weather permitting. Here the paschal candle will be lighted and we will follow the candle into the darkened church for the Service of Bible readings. As the paschal candle is carried in solemn procession, so Christ leads us out of the slavery of sin into the freedom of the children of God. Joy in Christ, as the light, the life, and the freedom of redeemed humanity, bursts forth in the great Easter Proclamation.

# The Service of Readings

In our near-dark church, we hear a series of readings recounting God's mighty acts on behalf of his people from the beginning of creation. This includes the sweep of salvation

history, recalling the redemption of a world spoiled by the fall of humanity. Between the readings, various canticles and prayers enhance our meditation.

# Holy Baptism

In the ancient Church, this liturgy was the supreme moment for the Baptism of new converts into the Church. It marked the culmination of their studies, repentance, fasting, and prayer for their new life in the Church. We have no Baptisms for this evening, but we do mean to renew our own Baptisms.

### The First Eucharist of the Resurrection

The Service comes to its climax with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. The church bells, which have been silent since Thursday, peal out the joyous news of the Resurrection, and we stand to sing "Gloria in Excelsis" and celebrate the Holy Meal made ours through Christ's death and resurrection. No other Eucharist of the Church year is more significant than this first Easter Eucharist, for it is the solemn anniversary celebration of Christ's Passover from death to resurrection.

# The Service of Light

#### THE BLESSING OF THE FIRE

- P Dear friends in Christ: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus passed over from death to life, the Church invites her members dispersed throughout the world to gather in vigil and prayer. For this is the Passover of the Lord, in which by hearing his Word and celebrating his Sacraments, we share in his victory over death.
- **P** The Lord be with you.
- And also with you.
- P Let us pray: Father, through your Son you have bestowed upon your people the brightness of your light. Bless + this new fire, and grant that in this paschal feast we may so burn with heavenly desires, that with pure minds we may attain to the festival of everlasting light; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### THE PASCHAL CANDLE

A great candle, the paschal candle, is prepared by tracing on it the Sign of the Cross, the letters Alpha and Omega, and the numerals of the year. The minister says:

P Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega. All time belongs to him, and all the ages. To him be glory and dominion, forever and ever.

#### Amen.

Five incense studs, representing the five wounds of Christ are now inserted into the candle in the form of a cross as the minister says:

P By his wounds holy, by his wounds glorious, may Christ our Lord guard us and keep us.

#### Amen.

The minister now lights the candle from the fire.

- P The light of Christ, who rises this night in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.
- **P** The Lord be with you.
- **And also with you.**
- P Bless + we pray, O God, this lighted candle and those upon whom it may shine, that all who this night shall be partakers of your Holy Mysteries may be filled with your grace and heavenly benediction; that as we were once darkness but are now light in the Lord, we may walk as children of light; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### PROCESSION TO THE FONT

The procession forms and moves into the church, where we gather around the Baptismal Font. The order of procession is: Deacon with paschal candle, ministers, and people. Two times the Deacon will stop and intone, the people imitating the Deacon's intonation:



Having arrived before the altar, the Deacon turns to face the congregation, and, when all have reached their places, lifts the candle high and sings a third time:

**D** The Light of Christ.

#### **☑** Thanks be to God!

The people gather around the font and light their candles, with light from the paschal candle spreading out over the congregation, passing from neighbor to neighbor. Try to not tip lighted candles. All hold the candles throughout the Easter Proclamation. The people remain standing.


### The Easter Proclamation

Rejoice, now, all heavenly choirs of angels, and celebrate the divine mysteries with exultation; and, for the victory of so great a King, sound the trumpet of salvation.

Exult, also, O earth, enlightened with such radiance; and, made brilliant by the splendor of the eternal King, know that the ancient darkness has been banished from all the world.

Be glad also, O mother Church, clothed with the brightness of such a light, and let this house resound with the triumphant voices of the peoples.

Wherefore, dearly beloved, who stand in the clarity of this bright and holy light, join with me, I ask you, in praising the lovingkindness of almighty God; through our Lord, Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and rules with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.



It is indeed right and salutary

that we should with full devotion of heart and mind and voice praise the invisible God, the Father Almighty, and his only Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ;

who paid for us the debt of Adam to the eternal Father, and who by his precious blood

redeemed us from the bondage to the ancient sin.

For this indeed is the Paschal Feast in which the true Lamb is slain, by whose blood the doorposts of the faithful are made holy.

This is the night in which, in ancient times,

you delivered our forebears, the children of Israel, from the land of Egypt; and led them, dry-shod, through the Red Sea.

This, indeed, is the night in which the darkness of sin

has been purged away by the rising brightness.

This is the night in which all who believe in Christ

are rescued from evil and the gloom of sin,

are renewed in grace, and are restored to holiness.

This is the night in which, breaking the chains of death,

Christ arises from hell in triumph.

For it would have profited us nothing to be born

had we not also been redeemed.

Oh, how wonderful the condescension of your lovingkindness!

Oh, how inestimable the goodness of your love,

that to redeem a slave you delivered up your Son!

O necessary sin of Adam that is wiped away by the death of Christ!

O happy fault that was worthy to have so great a Redeemer!

O night truly blessed which alone was worthy

to know the time and the hour wherein Christ arose again from hell!

This is the night of which it is written:

"and the night is as clear as the day";

and, "then shall my night be turned into day."

The holiness of this night puts to flight the deeds of wickedness;

washes away sin; restores innocence to the fallen, and joy to those who mourn; casts out hate; brings peace; and humbles earthly pride.

Therefore, in this night of grace, receive, O holy Father,

this evening sacrifice of praise;

which the Church lays before you in the solemn offering of the candle.

We sing the glories of this pillar of fire,

the brightness of which is not diminished,

even when its light is divided and borrowed.

For it is fed by the melting wax which the bees, your servants,

have made for the substance of this candle.

O night truly blessed in which heaven and earth are joined-things human and things divine.

We, therefore, pray to you, O Lord,

that this candle, burning to the honor of your name,

will continue to vanquish the darkness of this night and be mingled with the lights of heaven.

May he who is the morning star find it burning--

that morning star which never sets,

that morning star which, rising again from the grave,

faithfully sheds light on all the human race.

And we pray, O Lord, rule, govern,

and preserve with your continual protection your whole Church,

giving us peace in this time of our paschal rejoicing; through the same Lord, Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Then the people go to their pews, extinguish their candles, and sit for the Service of Readings.

# The Service of Readings

P Dear friends in Christ: we have begun our solemn Vigil. Let us now listen attentively to the Word of God, recalling how he saved his people throughout history, and in the fullness of time, sent his own Son to be our Redeemer. Through this Easter celebration may God bring to perfection the saving work he has begun in us.

# Congregational Renewal of Baptismal Vows

- P Through the Paschal mystery, dear friends, we are buried with Christ by Baptism into his death and raised with him to newness of life. I call upon you, therefore, now that our Lenten observance is ended, to renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and all his works and promised to serve God faithfully in his holy catholic church.
- Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?
- **Q** I will, with God's help.
- Mill you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?
- **Q** I will, with God's help.
- P Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?
- **Q** I will, with God's help.
- Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
- **Q** I will, with God's help.
- Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?
- **G** I will, with God's help.
- A May Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and bestowed upon us the forgiveness of sins, keep us in eternal life by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord.
- Amen.

The people now form a line and move to the font and are signed with water. There are two stations, with the Presiding Minister at one and the Assisting Minister at the other.

- P Receive the mark of the water in the sign of the Cross.
- A Remember that in Baptism you have been buried with Christ and are risen with Him again.

#### PROCESSION OUTDOORS

After being signed with the baptismal water, please head outdoors until all are signed. We gather on the sidewalk, facing the church steps, while the Chancel is prepared for the joyous first celebration of the Easter Eucharist.

DEACON'S LITANY The Litany is chanted by the Cantor and congregation.

[Spoken] Let us pray for the whole people of God in Christ Jesus, and for all people according to their needs, singing "Lord, have mercy."



For the peace from above, and for our salvation, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For the peace of the whole world, for the well-being of the Church of God, and for the unity of all, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For this holy house, and for all who offer here their worship and praise, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For Bishop Dan, for all servants of the Church, and for all the members of this parish, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For our public servants, for the government and those who protect us, that they may be upheld and strengthened in every good deed, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For those who work to bring peace, justice, health, and protection in this and every place, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For those who bring offerings, those who do good works in this congregation, those who toil, those who sing, and for all the people here present who await from the Lord great and abundant mercy, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

For favorable weather, for an abundance of the fruits of the earth, and for peaceful times, let us pray to the Lord.

For refugees and for casualties of war, for the sick and for those recovering from surgery, and for our deliverance from all affliction, wrath, danger, sickness, and need, let us <u>pray</u> to the Lord.

Concluding as follows:



### EPISTLE READING ......Romans 6:3-11 (NRSV)

We were joined into the death of Jesus Christ in baptism and so are liberated from the dominion of sin. We also anticipate that we will be joined into the resurrection of Christ and so will be liberated from the hold death has over our mortal bodies.

<sup>3</sup>Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? <sup>4</sup>Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

<sup>5</sup>For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united

with him in a resurrection like his. <sup>6</sup>We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. <sup>7</sup>For whoever has died is freed from sin. <sup>8</sup>But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. <sup>9</sup>We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again;







#### Preface for Easter Sunday

It is indeed right and salutary that we should at all times and in all places offer thanks and praise to you, O Lord, holy Father, almighty and ever-living God. But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of our Lord; for he is the true Passover Lamb who gave himself to take away our sin, who by his death has destroyed death, and by his rising has brought us to eternal life. And so, with Mary Magdalene and Peter and all the witnesses of the resurrection, with earth and sea and all their creatures, and with angels and archangels, cherubim and seraphim, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:



#### Eucharistic Prayer II

You are indeed holy, O God, the fountain of all holiness; you bring light from darkness, life from death, speech from silence. We worship you for our lives and for the world you give us. We thank you for the new world to come and for the love that will rule all in all. We praise you for the grace shown to Israel, your chosen, the people of your promise: the rescue from Egypt, the gift of the promised land, the memory of the fathers, the homecoming from exile, and the prophets' words that will not be in vain. In all this we bless you for your only-begotten Son, who fulfilled and will fulfill all your promises.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.


For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

### **G** Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Therefore, O God, with this bread and cup we remember the incarnation of our Son: his human birth and the covenant he made with us. We remember the sacrifice of his life: his eating with outcasts and sinners, and his acceptance of death. But chiefly on this day we remember his rising from the tomb, his ascension to the seat of power, and his sending of the holy and life-giving Spirit. We cry out for the resurrection of our lives,

when Christ will come again in beauty and power to share with us the great and promised feast.

- Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.
- P Send now, we pray, your Holy Spirit, that we and all who share in this bread and cup may be united in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, may enter the fullness of the kingdom of heaven, and may receive our inheritance with all your saints in light.
- Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.
- P Join our prayers with those of your servants of every time and every place, and unite them with the ceaseless petitions of our great high priest until he comes as victorious Lord of all.




The Lord's Prayer

#### DISTRIBUTION OF THE SACRAMENT

- + Holy Communion is offered to all baptized Christians. Lutherans celebrate this Blessed Sacrament with the understanding that the Body and Blood of Christ are truly present in the consecrated bread and wine and are distributed to and received by all who commune.
- + Please come forward by way of the center aisle and the minister will drop the Communion host into your hands. Then bear off to the side where the minister will distribute the Eucharistic wine. If you would like to receive the Wine then please try to take the little plastic cup from the minister by the top edge. When you are done with the wine, please place your little cup on the tray. We mean to carefully and respectfully dispose of the remaining wine in the little cups.
- → You are welcome to bring your hymnal with you to the Communion rail and continue singing the hymns until receiving the sacrament.
- + If you should desire to pray quietly before or while receiving the Holy Sacrament, as many Christians do, here is one of Luther's prayers for that purpose:

Land desire your help and grace. So I come with no other plea except that I have heard the gracious invitation to come to your altar. I am unworthy, but you have assured me I shall have forgiveness of all sins through your body and blood which I eat and drink in this sacrament. Amen, dear Lord; your Word is true. I do not doubt it. Let happen to me whatever you say. Amen.

+ And if you should desire to pray quietly after receiving the Holy Communion, here is a possible such prayer. It is based on a prayer of St. Basil the Great (329-379):

Master, Christ our God: I thank you for all the good things which you have bestowed upon me, and for this partaking of your life-giving Sacrament. And I pray: keep me, my loved ones, and this congregation under your protection, and in the shadow of your wings. For you are the Bread of Life, the Fountain of holiness, the Giver of good things, and unto you we

ascribe glory: to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

### Some Notes on Our Church Nave and Liturgy

- + Our congregation is one of the historic Lutheran churches in town, going back to the middle of the Civil War, 1863. We are a member of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC). The national bishop of the NALC is Rev. Daniel Selbo.
- + You might be interested to hear about our reredos the wooden altarpiece at the front of our church. It was hand carved by artists in Germany's Black Forest. The left statue is Moses, with the Ten Commandments in his left arm and the two horn-like rays of light shining forth from his face after his encounter with the Lord on Mt. Sinai (Exodus 34:29-30). The right-hand statue is St. John the Evangelist, with a quill pen in his hand and an eagle at his feet. And the center statue is Jesus Christ, the personal unity and the most perfect meaning of the Law (Moses) and the Gospel (St. John).
- + Our painting of the Transfiguration of Our Lord, above the reredos, pays tribute to the founding liturgy of our congregation, Transfiguration Sunday, February 11, 1863. Our painting shows Jesus, Moses, and Elijah elevated above the ground, so that at first glance you might think that it is a painting of the Ascension. But the saintly company with Jesus Moses and Elijah on either side, with Peter, James, and John fallen down in awe at the sight point to the Transfiguration. Heaven

- knows and gives credit to the anonymous painter of our painting, but we note that it is in the style of Raphael's painting of *The Transfiguration* (1517-1520). Raphael also placed Jesus, Moses, and Elijah elevated above the disciples.
- + Our church windows were installed in 1973 and constitute a visual meditation on an ancient hymn of the Church, the *Te Deum*. Pamphlets are available in the rear of the church explaining the windows one by one.
- + Our church bells, named *Glaube*, *Hoffnung*, and *Liebe* for Faith, Hope, and Love, were a gift from German Empress Augusta Viktoria.
- + A hint about acoustics: you will be able to hear the choir and organ better if you sit toward the front half of the church. The overhanging choir balcony obscures some of the beauty of the music for those sitting under it.
- + Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me," and we view the presence of children in worship, even when they are wiggly and noisy, as a gift to the Church and an encouragement that our congregation is growing!
- + Our worship book is the green hymnal, the *Lutheran Book of Worship* ("LBW"). This book contains both liturgies and hymns, with liturgies in the first half and hymns in the second. Sometimes we include

hymns from *With One Voice* ("WOV") or from *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* ("ELW").

+ If you have a cell phone, please silence it for the liturgy. And please finish coffee or other drinks out in the narthex rather than in the main nave.
