arm welcome, everyone, to Immanuel Lutheran Church. The Church in its ancient wisdom did not try to compress the story of our Lord's Last Supper, Footwashing, Passion, and Resurrection into just one service, but, as if lingering in love over each part of the story, spread the celebration of our salvation over these three holy days, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil. We are invited, then, to worship as if in one long liturgy, extended over these evenings, with time between services for rest and work.



This evening's liturgy teaches us that we are to love one another and to be servants to each other as Jesus became our servant. Our commitment to this loving service is signified in this evening's washing of feet, following the example the Lord gave us on the night before his death.

It is in the Holy Communion that the members of Christ's body participate most intimately in his love. Remembering our Lord's Last Supper with his disciples, we eat the bread and share the cup of this meal. This Meal is the promise of the great banquet

we will share with all the faithful when our Lord returns, the culmination of our reconciliation with God and each other.

#### INVITATION TO CONFESSION

- **P** In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- Amen.
- This evening's Maundy Thursday liturgy brings to an end the season of Lent. In this
  Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin,
  death, and the devil —all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the
  struggle to which we were committed at Baptism, and it is a struggle that should
  always lead us back to the Church and draw us closer to Christ.

Within the community of his Church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the words of absolution, we receive forgiveness as from God himself. This absolution we should not doubt, but firmly believe that thereby our sins are forgiven before God in heaven, for it comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord.

We now bring our Lenten journey to a close through the Maundy Thursday order of Confession and Forgiveness, so that with undistracted minds and settled spirits, we may turn to contemplate the great and final events of Holy Week.

#### CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

**P** Let us kneel and make confession to God.

Kneel/Stand. Silence for reflection and self-examination.

- Almighty God, merciful Father: I, a troubled and penitent sinner, confess to you all my sins and iniquities with which I have offended you and for which I justly deserve your punishment. But I am sorry for them, and repent of them, and pray for your boundless mercy. For the sake of the suffering and death of your Son, Jesus Christ, be gracious and merciful to me, a poor sinful being; forgive my sins, give me your Holy Spirit for the amendment of my sinful life, and bring me to life everlasting. Amen.
- P Almighty God in his mercy has given his Son to die for us and, for his sake, forgives us all our sins. Through his Holy Spirit he cleanses us and gives us power to proclaim the mighty deeds of God who called us out of darkness into the splendor of his light. As a called and ordained minister of the Church of Christ and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit. ## The Liturgy of the Word of God

FIRST LESSON ..... Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14, RSV

Israel remembered its deliverance from slavery in Egypt by celebrating the festival of Passover. This festival featured the Passover lamb, whose blood was used as a sign to protect God's people from the threat of death. The early church described the Lord's Supper using imagery from the Passover, especially in portraying Jesus as the lamb who delivers God's people from sin and death.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, <sup>2</sup>"This month shall be for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup>Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month they shall take every man a lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household; <sup>4</sup>and if the household is too small for a lamb, then a man and his neighbor next to his house shall take according to the number of persons; according to what each can eat you shall make your count for the lamb... <sup>11</sup>In this manner you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you

shall eat it in haste. It is the LORD's passover. <sup>12</sup>For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will smite all the first-born in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup>The blood shall be a sign for you, upon the houses where you are; and when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall fall upon you to destroy you, when I smite the land of Egypt.

<sup>14</sup>"This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as an ordinance for ever."

In the bread and cup of the Lord's Supper, we experience intimate fellowship with Christ and with one another, because it involves his body given for us and the new covenant in his blood. Faithful participation in this meal is a living proclamation of Christ's death until he comes in the future. St. Paul writes this:


For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, <sup>24</sup>and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." <sup>25</sup>In the same way also the cup,

after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." <sup>26</sup> For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

#### Before the Gospel:

**P** The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 13th chapter. ■



Now before the feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. <sup>2</sup>And during supper, when the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, <sup>3</sup>Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, <sup>4</sup>rose from supper, laid aside his garments, and girded himself with a towel. <sup>5</sup>Then he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which he was girded. 6He came to Simon Peter; and Peter said to him, "Lord, do you wash my feet?" <sup>7</sup>Jesus answered him, "What I am doing you do not know now, but afterward you will understand." <sup>8</sup> Peter said to him, "You shall never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "If I do not wash you, you have no part in me." <sup>9</sup>Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" <sup>10</sup>Jesus said to him, "He who has bathed does not need to wash, except for his feet, but he is clean all over; and you are clean, but not every one of you." <sup>11</sup>For he knew who was to betray him; that was why he said, "You are not all clean."

<sup>12</sup>When he had washed their feet, and taken his garments, and resumed his

place, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? <sup>13</sup>You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. <sup>14</sup>If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup>For I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. <sup>16</sup>Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master; nor is he who is sent greater than he who sent him. <sup>17</sup>If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them...

<sup>31</sup>When he [Judas] had gone out, Jesus said, "Now is the Son of man glorified,

and in him God is glorified; <sup>32</sup>if God is glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself, and glorify him at once. <sup>33</sup>Little children, yet a little while I am with you. You will seek me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going you cannot come.' <sup>34</sup>A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. <sup>35</sup>By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

And so, with the Church on earth and the host of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

Eucharistic Prayer III (This prayer is based on ancient models from the Liturgy of St. James, the Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom, Apostolic Constitutions, the Roman Missal, and the Liturgy of St. Basil. Its only congregational response is at the end, "Amen," which the congregation is encouraged to say loudly and boldly as the principle Amen of the service. See 1 Corinthians 14:16.)

P You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God; you are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory. You so loved the world that you gave your only Son, that whoever believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. Having come into the world, he fulfilled for us your holy will and accomplished our salvation.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering, therefore, his salutary command, his life-giving Passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension, and his promise to come again, we give thanks to you, Lord God Almighty, not as we ought, but as we are able; and we implore you mercifully to accept our praise and thanksgiving, and, with your Word and Holy Spirit, to bless us, your servants, and these your own gifts of bread and wine; that we and all who share in the body and blood of your Son may be filled with heavenly peace and joy, and, receiving the forgiveness of sin, may be sanctified in soul and body, and have our portion with all your saints.

All honor and glory are yours, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, in your holy Church, now and forever. **Amen!** 


#### The Lord's Prayer



## Psalm 22, LBW

<sup>1</sup>My God, my God, why have you forsaken me and are so far from my cry, and from the words of my distress?

<sup>2</sup>O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; by night as well, but I find no rest.

<sup>3</sup>Yet you are the Holy One, enthroned upon the praises of Israel.

<sup>4</sup>Our forefathers put their trust in you; they trusted, and you delivered them.

<sup>5</sup>They cried out to you and were delivered; they trusted in you and were not put to shame.

<sup>6</sup>But as for me, I am a worm and no man, scorned by all and despised by the people.

<sup>7</sup>All who see me laugh me to scorn; they curl their lips and wag their heads, saying,

8"He trusted in the LORD; let him deliver him; let him rescue him, if he delights in him."

<sup>9</sup>Yet you are he who took me out of the womb, and kept me safe upon my mother's breast.

<sup>10</sup>I have been entrusted to you ever since I was born; you were my God when I was still in my mother's womb.

<sup>11</sup>Be not far from me, for trouble is near, and there is none to help.

<sup>12</sup>Many young bulls encircle me; strong bulls of Bashan surround me.

<sup>13</sup>They open wide their jaws at me, like a ravening and a roaring lion.

<sup>14</sup>I am poured out like water; all my bones are out of joint; my heart within my breast is melting wax.

<sup>15</sup>My mouth is dried out like a pot-sherd; my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth;

and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.

<sup>16</sup>Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers circle around me; they pierce my hands and my feet, I can count all my bones.

<sup>17</sup>They stare and gloat over me;

they divide my garments among them; they cast lots for my clothing.

<sup>18</sup>Be not far away, O LORD;

you are my strength; hasten to help me.

<sup>19</sup>Save me from the sword,

my life from the power of the dog.

<sup>20</sup>Save me from the lion's mouth,

my wretched body from the horns of wild bulls.

<sup>21</sup>I will declare your name to my brethren;

in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.

<sup>22</sup>Praise the LORD, you that fear him;

stand in awe of him, O offspring of Israel; all you of Jacob's line, give glory.

<sup>23</sup>For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty;

neither does he hide his face from them;

but when they cry to him he hears them.

<sup>24</sup>My praise is of him in the great assembly;

I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship him.

<sup>25</sup>The poor shall eat and be satisfied,

and those who seek the LORD shall praise him:

"May your heart live forever!"

<sup>26</sup>All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD, and all the families of the nations shall bow before him.

<sup>27</sup>For kingship belongs to the LORD;

he rules over the nations.

<sup>28</sup>To him alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship; all who go down to the dust fall before him.

<sup>29</sup>My soul shall live for him; my descendants shall serve him; they shall be known as the LORD's forever.

<sup>30</sup>They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn the saving deeds that he has done.

## Psalm 88, LBW

<sup>1</sup>O LORD, my God, my Savior, by day and night I cry to you.

<sup>2</sup>Let my prayer enter into your presence; incline your ear to my lamentation.

<sup>3</sup>For I am full of trouble;

my life is at the brink of the grave.

<sup>4</sup>I am counted among those who go down to the pit;

I have become like one who has no strength;

<sup>5</sup>lost among the dead,

like the slain who lie in the grave,

<sup>6</sup>whom you remember no more,

for they are cut off from your hand.

<sup>7</sup>You have laid me in the depths of the pit, in dark places, and in the abyss.

# Some Notes on Our Church Nave and Liturgy

- + Our congregation is one of the historic Lutheran churches in town, going back to the middle of the Civil War, 1863. We are a member of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC). The national bishop of the NALC is Rev. Daniel Selbo.
- + You might be interested to hear about our reredos — the wooden altarpiece at the front of our church. It was hand carved by artists in Germany's Black Forest. The left statue is Moses, with the Ten Commandments in his left arm and the two horn-like rays of light shining forth from his face after his encounter with the Lord on Mt. Sinai (Exodus 34:29-30). The right-hand statue is St. John the Evangelist, with a quill pen in his hand and an eagle at his feet. And the center statue is Jesus Christ, the personal unity and the most perfect meaning of the Law (Moses) and the Gospel (St. John).
- + Our painting of the Transfiguration of Our Lord, above the reredos, pays tribute to the founding liturgy of our congregation, Transfiguration Sunday, February 11, 1863. Our painting shows

- Jesus, Moses, and Elijah elevated above the ground, so that at first glance you might think that it is a painting of the Ascension. But the saintly company with Jesus Moses and Elijah on either side, with Peter, James, and John fallen down in awe at the sight point to the Transfiguration. Heaven knows and gives credit to the anonymous painter of our painting, but we note that it is in the style of Raphael's painting of *The Transfiguration* (1517-1520). Raphael also placed Jesus, Moses, and Elijah elevated above the disciples.
- + Our church windows were installed in 1973 and constitute a visual meditation on an ancient hymn of the Church, the *Te Deum*. Pamphlets are available in the rear of the church explaining the windows one by one.
- + Our church bells, named *Glaube*, *Hoffnung*, and *Liebe* for Faith, Hope, and Love, were a gift from German Empress Augusta Viktoria.
- + A hint about acoustics: you will be able to hear the choir and organ better if you sit toward the front half of the

- church. The overhanging choir balcony obscures some of the beauty of the music for those sitting under it.
- + Our worship book is the green hymnal, the *Lutheran Book of Worship* ("LBW"). This book contains both liturgies and hymns, with liturgies in the first half and hymns in the second. Sometimes
- we include hymns from *With One Voice* ("WOV") or from *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* ("ELW").
- + If you have a cell phone, please silence it for the liturgy. And please finish coffee or other drinks out in the narthex rather than in the main nave.
